About Uganda Christian University

Uganda Christian University (UCU) was established by the Church of Uganda in 1997 in response to a call for quality university education with a Christian perspective. UCU replaced the historic Bishop Tucker Theological College which trained clergy and Educators during its 84-year history from 1913-1997. The local chief, Hamu Mukasa, granted land for the college to operate in Mukono.

By the late 1990s, the Church of Uganda sought to have a broader impact on society through university education not only educating clergy but other professionals as well. In 2004, UCU became the first private university to be chartered or accredited by the Government of Uganda.

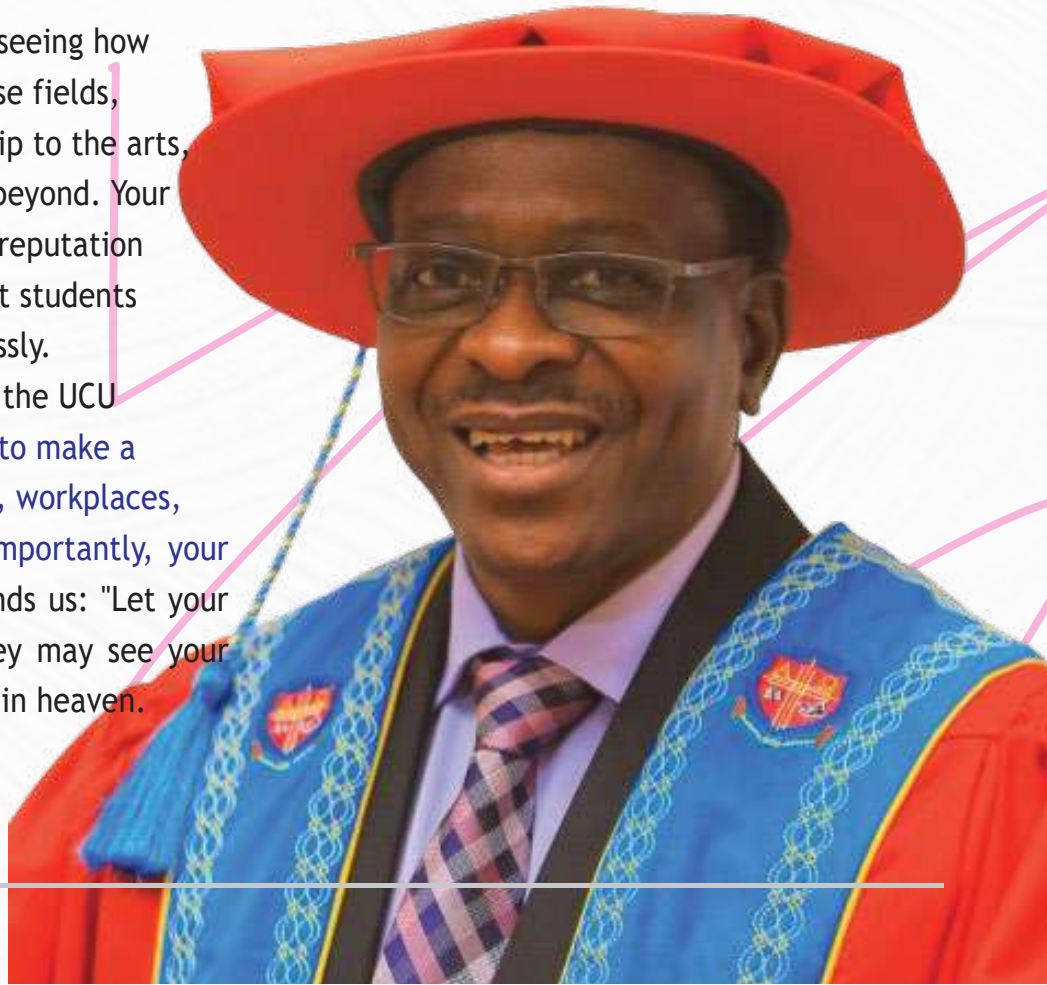

Retracing the steps of the Alumni Association

Certainly, the term “alumnus” is a Latin word derived from the verb “alere,” which translates to “to bring up” or “to nourish.” It specifically refers to a male graduate. Conversely, “alumna” denotes a female graduate. For female graduates, the plural form is “alumnae.” These terms are commonly used in academic contexts to describe individuals who have completed their studies at a particular institution. They are often associated with a sense of pride and belonging to the alumni community, which provides networking opportunities and support. The terms acquired significance at Uganda Christian University in 2003 when a group of former students, primarily staff, established an Alumni Association. 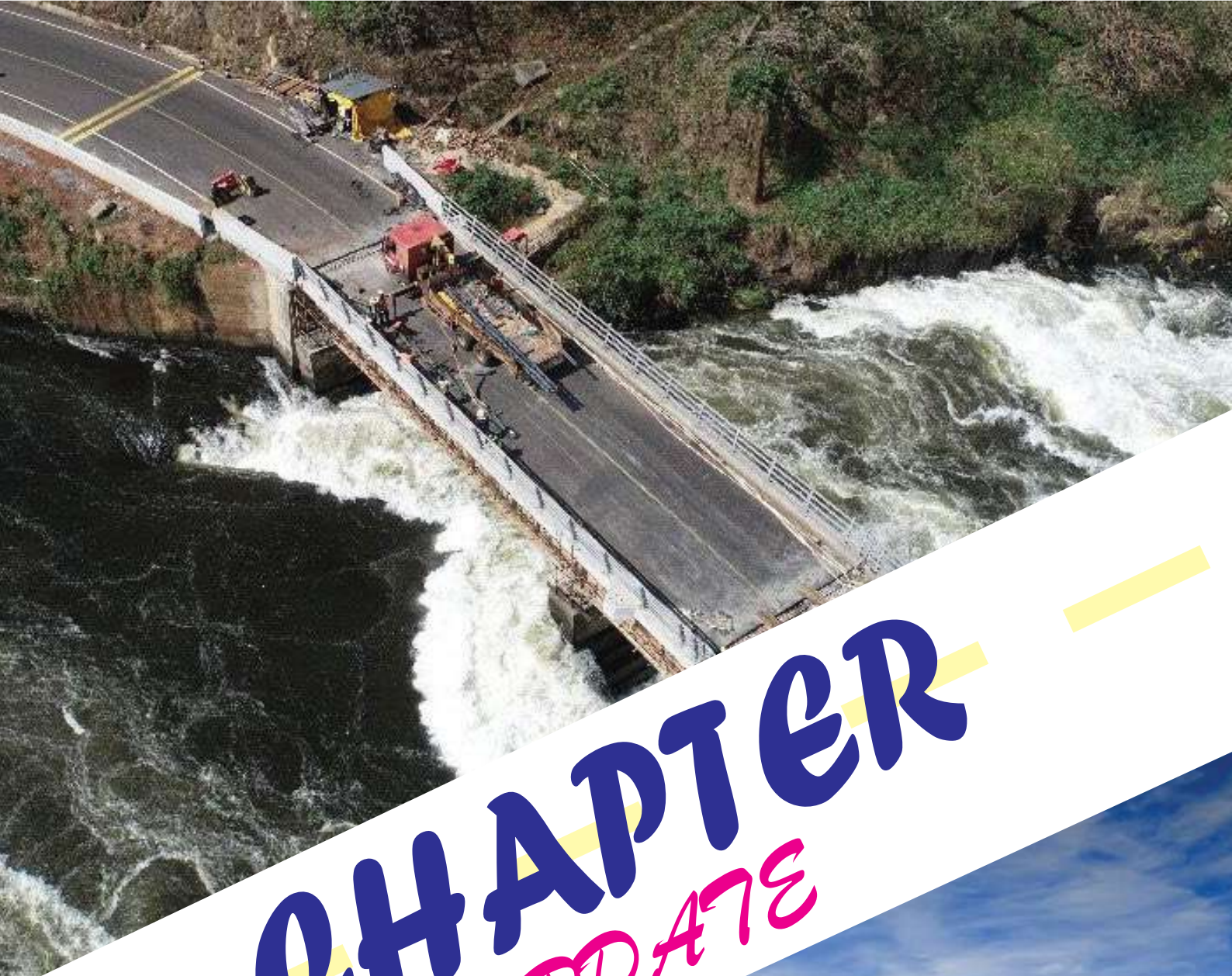

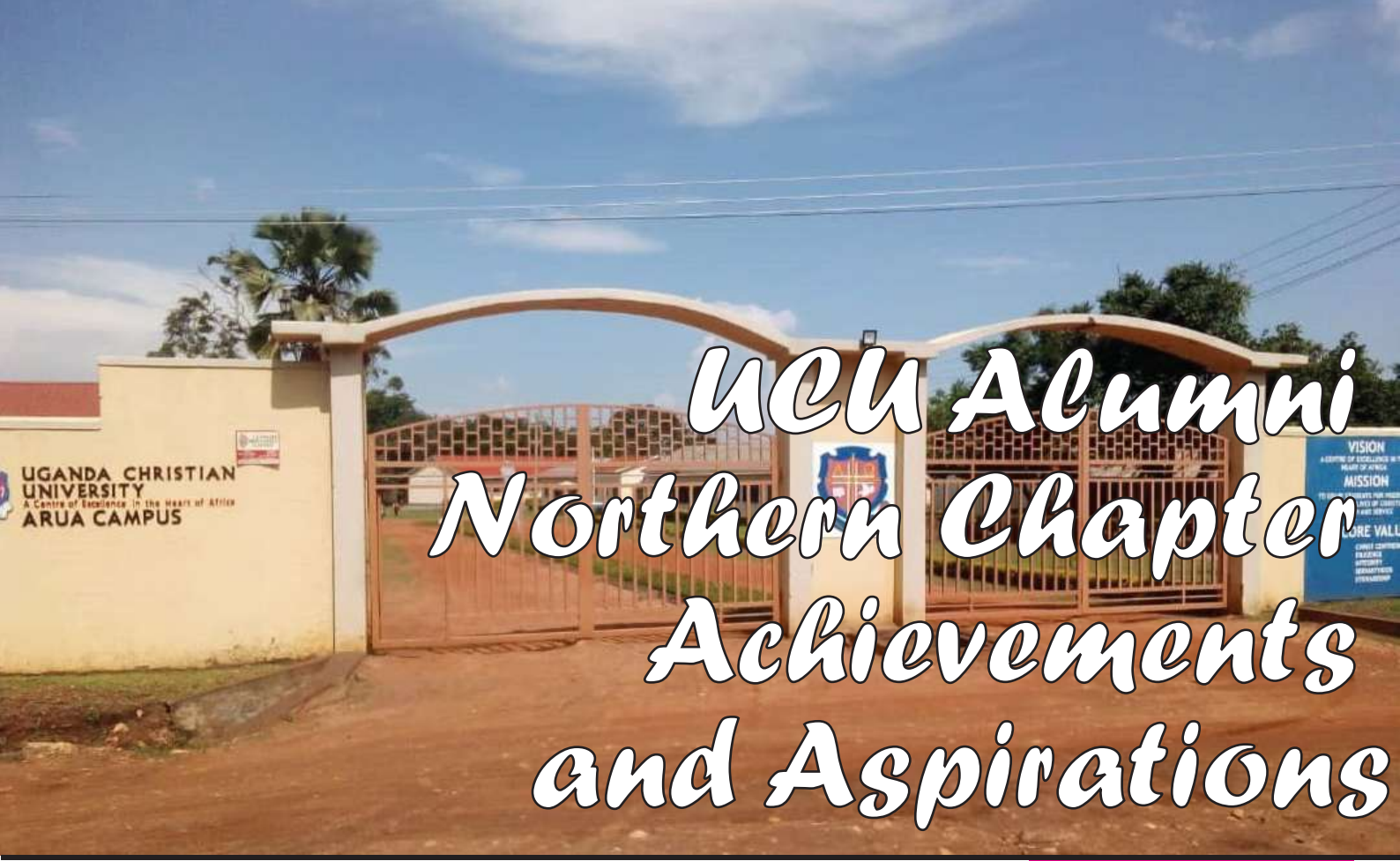

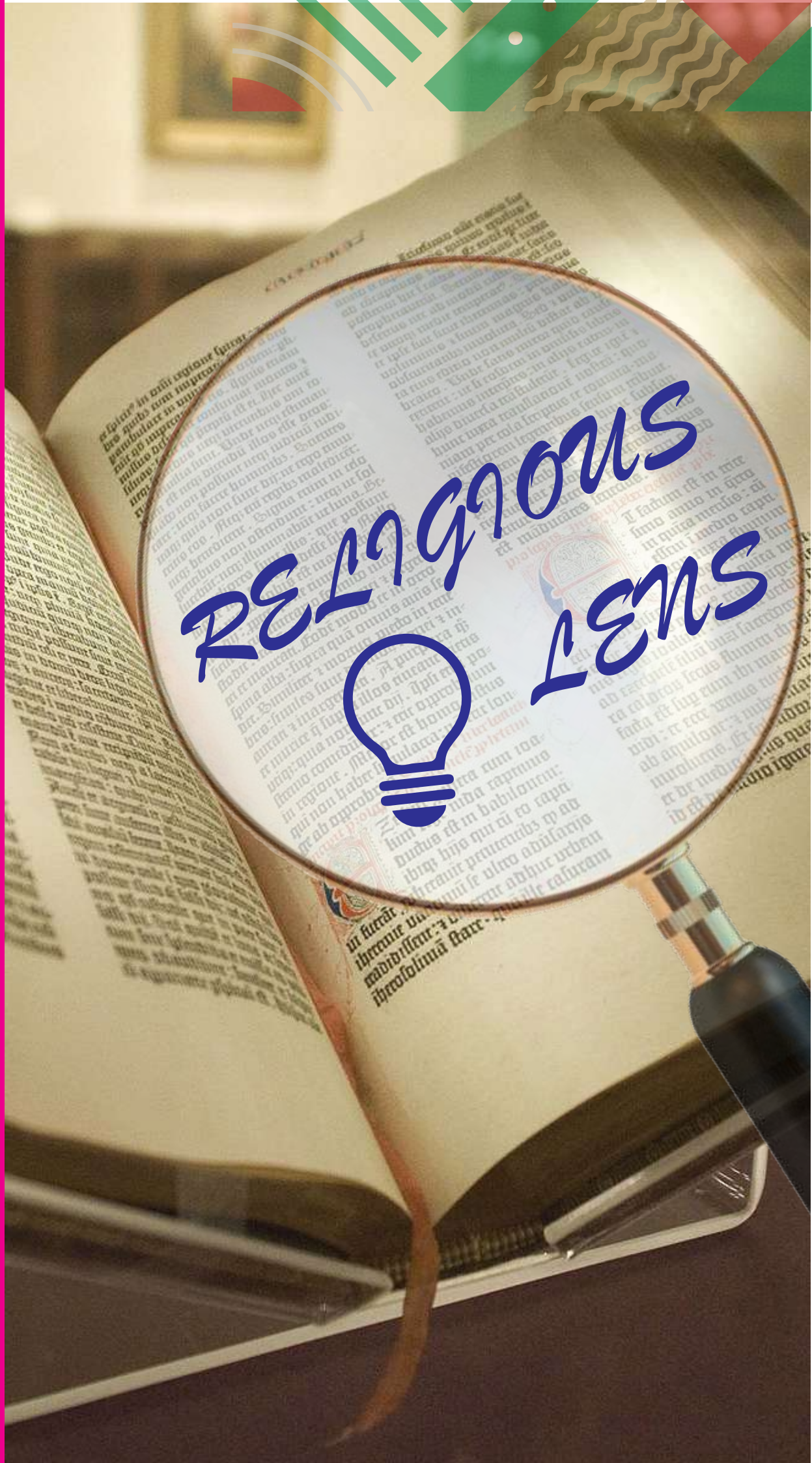
The initiative, launched as a pilot phase at the ceremony, has set a tone for future graduations.

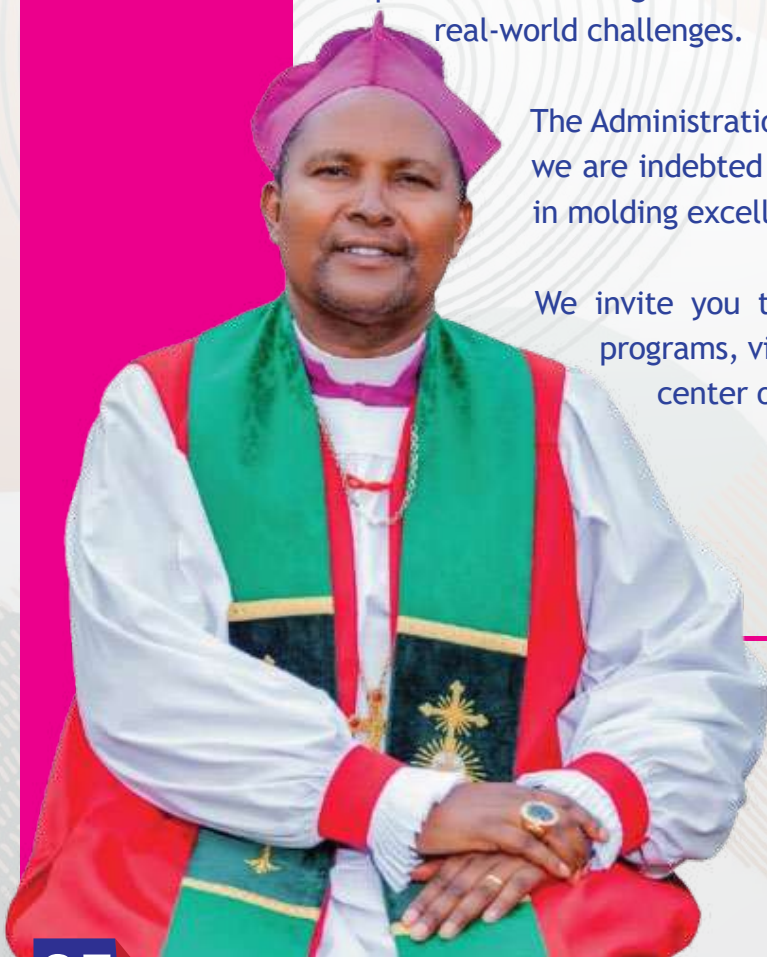

We used to pay a guild fee of 1000/- per term per student, but we were able to offer students fair services of TV set per residential Hall: Mackay, Wilmington, Walker, the current Academics block which was Luwum Hall, Mukasa which is currently the Postgraduate offices, and Thelma which now goes for Honor's College.

Generally, our time was a time of learning how to govern because it was our first experience to run

astudent's guild although for me, I came for my Bachelor's degree when I was a College Principal for six years..... So, I had an administrative experience. We theologians had no problem mixing up with non theologians but the young admitted students feared somehow to come very close to us until almost a year ended. My leadership experience was enriched by the coming together of young lay people and ordained old people. In University activities, we were all one. The early days of UCU were tailored to the BTTC time table of studying from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Afternoons were for personal programs like going to Library, individual reading, washing and ironing or other programs. Every student was regarded mature like it is today. By the time I left, 1999 May, numbers had increased and programs also were added on.

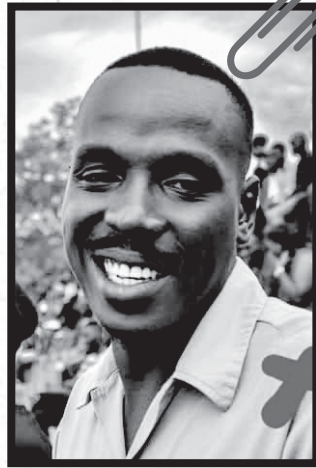

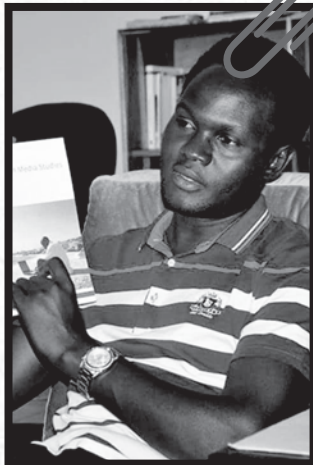

Think Big

Here are some key considerations to make it happen:

1. How are you going to meet your retirement needs? i.e how expensive will your needs be? The quickest proxy is to understand whether you want to maintain your current lifestyle. Statistics show that you will need at least 70% of your current earnings to maintain your current lifestyle. Do you have an investment that can maintain that?

2. **Start saving:** having understood your retirement needs and aspirations, start saving, keep saving. Start early, save small, be consistent, let the savings grow.

3. **Invest:** You need to understand the available investment options. There are licensed professional fund managers who can provide advice on what to invest in prior to and during retirement. At individual level, it is also important to learn some basic investment principles; learn about things like inflation, economic trends, trending investment information, and the like.

4. **Avoid investment mistakes prior to retirement.** There is a tendency to invest in things that make us happy - a good home, a nice car, a country home, a farm, a few businesses. Dear Alumni, Supporting Your Alma mater is the Vibe

In the USA, alumni have a long-standing tradition of philanthropy. Universities like Harvard and Princeton benefit greatly from the support of alumni. In the UK, alumni philanthropy has been growing. Schools and universities in those countries are increasingly building dedicated alumni networks for financial support and mentorship. There are different reasons why alumni choose to support their alma maters. Many feel a deep sense of loyalty to the institutions that shaped them, believing that their current success is rooted in the education and experiences gained during their time there. This sense of gratitude and responsibility is especially strong among those who have become distinguished in their careers. Supporting their former schools all owes them to contribute to the continued growth and legacy of the institution. However, those who are just beginning to succeed must also realize that the value of their degree is tied to the current reputation of the institution. By supporting their alma mater they help maintain or enhance the institution's prestige, which in turn increases the value of their credentials.

It's ironic how some alumni from different educational institutions choose to jump on the bandwagon of the public to criticize their alma maters, lamenting how standards have declined since their time as students. This phenomenon is particularly common within traditional institutions, which are sometimes held to sentimental expectations from past generations.

Even while it may be true that things aren't going well, you are expected to do more as an alumnus than just airing grievances that are usually centered around the downfall of the school. Rather than putting your energy on criticism, consider directing it toward engaging in alumni activities that directly support your former school. You can effect positive change in this way. In this digital age, many alumni associations have created online platforms, such as WhatsApp groups, to share information about the goings-on at their alma mater. Therefore, the case of promoting awareness was largely solved. Unfortunately, some members still treat these notifications much like the frequent promotional messages from Airtel or MTN.

From my observation, when alma maters in Uganda especially the traditional ones organize events such as fundraisers to engage alumni for support, a noticeable absence is often among the younger generation or the less empowered who are frustrated with life problems. Many likely feel financially inadequate to contribute while they are burdened with expenses like school fees, rent, and utilities, which is the reality. This leaves them feeling disconnected from such initiatives. However, we are called to give, not because we have extra resources, but as a way of serving God. Supporting education is an important form of service. God doesn't focus on the amount we give but on the sacrifice behind it. As the story of the poor widow in Mark 12:41 reminds us, even giving UGX 1,000, if it's all that you have, is valuable in God's eyes. Nevertheless, alumni can also contribute in non-financial ways, through advocacy and ambassadorship. Simply speaking positively about your alma mater in public conversations can inspire others to consider it for their children. In the digital age, alumni can also support by engaging with their alma mater on social media, sharing their content, celebrating their achievements, and tracking the school's progress. Furthermore, alumni who are in better positions can offer internships or entry-level job opportunities at their workplaces for current students or recent graduates. Not forgetting that Alumni can join alumni associations, or committees to provide input on how the school can improve.



A note on personal branding

During the past week, I had a close moment with my 8-year-old son Abba. During our engagement, Abba asked me "Daddy, why don't you buy a Lamborghini, a Bugatti or a Tesla cybertruck?"

I explained to him that I am comfortable with the cars I drive and they are not in that league.

The young fellow repeated this question several times in the following days. It took me some time to explain to him that I could not afford to own all types of cars in the world. In addition, the brands he was mentioning come at a price that I cannot afford. This was an answer that silenced Abba, albeit for a short period of time. He is very likely to be unable to tell the difference between the brands he mentioned and the ones I am driving at the age of 8 years old. Brands are simply products from known sources. **Branding has associations, benefits, and value. People often pay a premium for strong brands.** These are brands with many positive associations. In a saturated market of similar products, brand building represents an extremely challenging process of creating differentiation. There is no surprise that people prefer brands over products that are merely obvious. Through engagement and value, personal branding is able to build a reputation that creates a sense of individual superiority. As a result of the many other actions and activities, brand equity is fostered, which is critical to enhancing the value of the brand. In large part, brand equity reflects the positive perceptions, emotional attachments, and loyalty consumers have for a particular brand. Hence, it should come as no surprise that high-end brands will command the lion's share of the market based on their reputations and customer perceptions.

As with physical products, each human being creates associations based on their personality. By doing so, they will become a magnet for people or they will develop a repelling personality that will reduce the value of their brand. A person's emotions, attitudes, behavior, expectations, and associations play a significant role in their behavior. It is imperative that one understands how to navigate around these intangible traits in order to build a reputable personal brand. It is important to establish a desirable personal brand in order to establish influence, generate trust, and to differentiate one-self in a specific industry or market.

Next time you ask someone whether they have a telephone and they respond in the affirmative, remember to relate to their response. In most cases, their response will be: I own an iPhone, a Samsung smartphone, or some other brand name. In addition to their phone, they have a brand. It is similar to the case of the young Abba in the sense that we do not drive cars, but rather we drive brands.

Customers' preferences are reflected in the brand they choose. As individuals, we choose and value our friends, workmates, and colleagues based on their perceived value. In other words, this is the value they add to our lives. We are social beings because we are human. Accordingly, we relate to and associate with people based on their perceived value. Likewise, personal brands depreciate and diminish as a result of the benefits that individuals supposedly bring to our lives.

As we come to realize that the assumed brand value is of less significance, friendships and collegial relationships will also suffer. Building a brand is a complex and energy-consuming process. In spite of this, the reward at the end of this maze trail is extremely rewarding. Therefore, it is essential that the value of a personal brand be nurtured and carefully managed in order to ensure that it continues to grow on a daily basis. Keep your identity authentic and consistent. Use novel media, such as social media, to tell an impressive story about who you are. Your personal brand value may be diminished if these spaces are not properly managed. In order to build a personal brand, this is essential. A large number of individuals are not genuine, but hide behind fictional characters that are unrealistic. In such circumstances, it becomes difficult to establish your personal brand. Concentrate your efforts on those who you need to impress and ignore those who are not your target audience.
